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A look ahead at road construction in Plymouth

Below is a listing of various projects scheduled for the upcoming construction season. The City of Plymouth reminds motorists to pay attention to signage, slow down in construction zones and provide crews space to work safely.

Chankahda Trail Phase 3

Phase 3 of the Chankahda Trail (formerly County Road 47) reconstruction project includes completely rebuilding the roadway from Vicksburg Lane to Northwest Boulevard. The project also includes the installation of concrete curb and gutter, storm sewer improvements, water quality improvements, and trail on both sides of the roadway. Construction will be phased over two years – Chankahda Trail from Vicksburg Lane to Cheshire Parkway will be constructed in 2025; and Chankahda Trail from Cheshire Parkway to Northwest Boulevard in 2026.

36th Avenue Rehabilitation Project

A significant project in eastern Plymouth that will help improve pavement conditions and mitigate safety concerns is set for 36th Avenue from Zachary Lane to Highway 169.

The existing roadway includes an offset intersection between Kilmer and Lancaster lanes at 36th Avenue, which may subject motorists to quick turns and stops in front of oncoming traffic. To facilitate realignment and connect the roadways, the city purchased and demolished the former Apple Automatic Food Service building at 3525 Kilmer Lane N. Kilmer Lane will be shifted west through the property to allow alignment with Lancaster Lane and improve traffic flow and safety. A traffic signal will also be installed at the intersection.

Other components of the project include pick-up/drop-off realignment at Plymouth Middle School; modifying the roadway from Pilgrim to Lancaster lanes; pedestrian crossing enhancements near Armstrong High School and Plymouth Middle School; and trail construction.

New Roadways at The Boulevard

The Boulevard – a major mixed-use development project – is taking shape at the former Prudential campus at Bass Lake Road and Interstate 494. Two new roadways will be built within the 75-acre site to establish access for the planned mix of retail, residential and park amenities.

Sycamore Lane N. and Quinwood Lane N. will be constructed by the developer with access points from Chankahda Trail to the south and Bass Lake Road to the north. To learn more about the development, visit plymouthmn.gov/boulevard.

Neighborhood Street Projects

A project connecting two dead-end sections of Hamel Road just south of Highway 55 will begin in summer 2025. The project will connect Hamel Road between Urbandale Court N. and County Road 101 adjacent to the Park Nicollet facility. The Frick's Garden neighborhood will undergo street construction beginning this summer, which will include reconstruction of the roadway, installation of concrete curb and gutter, storm sewer improvements, and replacement of the existing water main.

In summer and fall of 2025, mill and overlay or pavement rehabilitation projects are set for the Mission, Seven Greens/Silverthorne, and Carlson Parkway/6th Avenue neighborhoods as part of the 2025 Street Rehabilitation Project.

MnDOT Projects in the Area

Though the work listed below will not occur in Plymouth, the Minnesota Department of Transportation is set to begin two projects that may impact motorists traveling in the area.

MnDOT will begin a large project to repair 34 bridges and ramps along I-394 and I-94 between downtown Minneapolis and Highway 100. Construction activities are anticipated to begin in summer 2025 and continue through fall 2026.

MnDOT is also set to begin a mill and overlay project on Highway 55 between Highway 100 to the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway bridge in Minneapolis.

Yard Waste Site Opens – The Plymouth Yard Waste Site, 14900 23rd Ave. N., is set to open for the season Wednesday, April 2 – weather permitting. The site is open to Plymouth, Wayzata, Long Lake and Medicine Lake residents only and identification is required. In April, the site is open 3-8 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The Yard Waste Site is closed Mondays and Tuesdays, Easter (April 20), and April 25-26 for Drop-Off Days. For more information, visit plymouthmn.gov/yardwaste.

Open Play – The Fieldhouse dome provides an indoor space for open play activities, including soccer, football and rugby.

Open play is typically available weekdays. To view open play pricing and available hours, visit plymouthmn.gov/fieldhouse.

Storm Drain Marking – Mark neighborhood storm drains to remind passersby that stormwater drains untreated into wetlands and lakes. This initiative is flexible and great for families or scout projects. Storm drain marking begins for the season when temperatures are consistently above 50 degrees. Counting Plymouth pollinators

As a volunteer, Christina Frazier counts insects such as beetles, caterpillars, ants, butterflies, bees and wasps in Plymouth parks, looking for diversity of species to identify what types of habitats are attracting pollinators.

Christina said, "It's exciting to see the impact that volunteers who care for the native plants at Fazendin Park and other parks are having! As I walk the native gardens, I count the pollinators but also see and smell the plants and enjoy being outside. Beyond the flowers' beauty, I see pollinators feeding from a variety of nectar-producing plants and pollinating for future plants. I also watch birds eating seeds and butterflies gathering in groups."

Several new sports, recreation facilities set up shop in Plymouth

With the continued demand for year-round sports and recreation spaces in the metro area, several business owners have been busy setting up shop in Plymouth this past year. These new indoor facilities offer a range of activities for a variety of ages and interests, including performance training, pickleball, baseball, golf, soccer, and play spaces for children.

After opening its doors in early January, **Big Island Bouldering** (161 Cheshire Lane, Suite 500) has become a draw for climbing enthusiasts. The facility features climbing walls of varying difficulty levels, a dedicated youth climbing area and adjustable walls for training. It also includes fitness equipment, showers and a coworking space.

Plymouth is home to two new facilities that offer year-round training and development opportunities for baseball and softball players. **Brower Baseball** (12755 Highway 55) and **Defined Baseball Academy** (12940 Highway 55), which both opened in January, offer specialized programs to help athletes improve their skills in the areas of pitching, batting and more, as well as strength and conditioning.

ETS Performance (14355 23rd Ave. N.), a sports training company that opened last June, provides personalized training programs geared towards enhancing both physical fitness and mental strength for athletes of all ages and skill levels.

An indoor playground facility that stays open 364 days per year, **InnerActive** (14600 28th Ave. N.) opened a new Plymouth location in February. Activity spaces include a jungle gym; slides; bounce zone; basketball court; toddler and infant play areas; party rooms; and play spaces for kicking, building and zooming.

KraftyGolf Studio (12700 Industrial Park Blvd.) became Plymouth's newest indoor golf training facility when it opened in February. The facility features three private hitting bays equipped with video cameras and a 3D motion measurement system to help golfers analyze their swing.

Level Up Soccer Coaching (2838 Vicksburg Lane N.) moved to a larger facility in February and offers private and small group coaching sessions for soccer players of all ages.

Adding to the growing pickleball scene, Plymouth has two new dedicated indoor pickleball facilities. **PickleX** (3955 Annapolis Lane), which opened in January, offers six courts for both casual and competitive players, as well as open play sessions, tournaments, lessons and leagues.

Pure Pickleball (13100 12th Ave. N.) offers 19 indoor courts for players of all skill levels, as well as a fitness center with weights, and cardio and weight machines. Open since February, the facility also hosts events and tournaments.

Plymouth Ice Center selected to host national high school hockey tournament in 2026

The Plymouth Ice Center has been selected to host the 2026 Chipotle-USA Hockey High School National Championships, in partnership with Wayzata Youth Hockey Association.

Set for March 18-22, 2026, the event will bring together the top high school teams from USA Hockey's 12 districts to the main tournament site – the Plymouth Ice Center, 3650 Plymouth Blvd.

"We're excited to welcome the best high school hockey teams in the country and thousands of visitors," Plymouth Ice Center Manager Erik Halverson said. "High-profile tournaments like this put the Plymouth Ice Center on the national stage and boost the local economy, benefitting area restaurants, hotels and retailers."

National tournaments bring large numbers of tournamentgoers, who spend significant dollars on lodging, food, transportation, supplies, gear and entertainment while they're in the area.

The Plymouth Ice Center and Wayzata Youth Hockey Association previously hosted the USA Hockey High School National Championships in 2023 and 2018.

Drawing more than 600,000 visitors a year, the Plymouth Ice Center is one of the busiest ice arenas in Minnesota. Home to Wayzata Youth Hockey Association, the second largest youth hockey association in the state, the Plymouth Ice Center also serves as home ice for Wayzata boys and girls hockey programs, and Providence Academy high school hockey. Additionally, the regional facility houses two elite hockey training schools/programs.

Low-Cost Rain Barrels, Compost Bins – To help promote environmental stewardship, the city is selling low-cost rain barrels and compost bins. To purchase a rain barrel or compost bin, visit plymouthmn.gov/environment. A printed or digital receipt of purchase must be presented when picking up. Orders may be picked up 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, May 10 at the Plymouth Maintenance Facility, 14900 23rd Ave. N. Compost bins cost \$76, plus tax. A 45-gallon rain barrel is \$90, plus tax. Rain barrels help conserve water by capturing rain and stormwater runoff to use for landscaping. Using a compost bin reduces waste and provides natural fertilizer for gardens.

Water Efficiency Rebate Program – To encourage conservation and reduce municipal water use, the City of Plymouth is accepting Water Efficiency Rebate Program applications. Funded, in part, by a grant from the Metropolitan Council, the program offers rebates for projects that replace inefficient toilets, irrigation systems, dishwashers and washing machines with WaterSense® or Energy Star® certified versions.

Items must be installed in Plymouth. All residential and commercial property owners who are customers of the municipal water supply could be eligible. Rebates are available for 75% of the cost of the item, up to a set maximum depending on the device. Rebate funds are limited and will be issued to qualified applicants on a first-come, first-served basis. Property owners can confirm device eligibility before purchasing by contacting werp@plymouthmn.gov or 763-509-5500. Tree Sale – The City of Plymouth's annual tree and shrub sale begins Saturday, March 1 for Plymouth residents. The sale features shade trees, evergreens, shrubs and fruit plants.

Market Value Notices – Market value notices for Plymouth properties will hit mailboxes in March.

The notices list the assessed value of the property and its classification for taxes payable in 2026. Property values affect how much tax residents pay each year. Residents with questions or concerns should call the Hennepin County assessor at the contact information listed on the valuation notice.

Plymouth undertakes projects to improve lake, stream water quality

As part of the City of Plymouth's ongoing commitment to environmental stewardship, the city is set to embark on two projects designed to benefit surface water resources and improve water quality in Medicine Lake.

West Medicine Lake Pond

One such project involves cleaning out the existing stormwater pond at West Medicine Lake Park and replacing its deteriorated weir, the barrier/outlet structure that connects the pond to West Medicine Lake. The stormwater pond captures sediment and nutrients from Plymouth Creek, prior to the water flowing into Medicine Lake.

Located on the west side of West Medicine Lake Drive, replacement work at the pond's weir is set for February and March. Pond dredging will take place April through June.

Plymouth Creek Stream Restoration

The city has also partnered with the Bassett Creek Watershed Management Commission to improve the overall water quality and drainage of Plymouth Creek, a stream that flows from Dunkirk Lane to the Plymouth Ice Center at 38th Avenue N. The Plymouth Creek Stream Restoration project will be completed in two phases during the next two winters, 2025-2026 and 2026-2027.

The project includes erosion control improvements, bank slope grading and minor dredging of accumulated sediment in certain areas. Additionally, crews will make vegetation enhancements to help improve area drainage, reduce erosion in the stream/channels, and improve water quality in Plymouth Creek and downstream Medicine Lake.

The stream restoration project may also include storm sewer pipe maintenance, replacement of damaged outlet structures and ecological habitat improvements.

City's Energy Action Plan Team begins work

The City of Plymouth has established a new Energy Action Plan Team – a group of 22 community members tasked with developing a strategic energy plan for the community.

Meet the Team

The group is comprised of Plymouth homeowners, renters, business representatives and students with a diverse range of backgrounds. Team members were selected following an application process held in January.

The group will participate in five workshops held from February to September to explore the community's energy use and develop goals surrounding renewable energy, energy efficiency and access to energy information.

Plan Development

The group is tasked with developing a strategic energy plan for the community, which will function, in part, as a work plan for city staff. The plan will include setting a vision, goals and focus areas, with strategies to reach defined targets.

The group will also encourage community buy-in to make changes that could include installing window insulation cling in the winter, adding insulation to poorly insulated areas of the home, installing solar panels, replacing inefficient appliances, and more.

"I really appreciate that this effort is resident led – it helps us ensure that we're not working in a silo," said Plymouth Environmental Stewardship Coordinator MK Anderson. "The plan the group develops will help the city and the community pull in the same direction with the same goals."

The Energy Action Plan is implemented through the Partners in Energy program, which is a collaboration between Xcel Energy, Center for Energy and the Environment, and the City of Plymouth.

Plymouth leverages new technology to complete citywide tree inventory

To better preserve trees, maintain property values and diversify the city's urban forest, the City of Plymouth will leverage new technology this year as it embarks on a robust multi-year initiative – a Smart Tree Inventory.

A partnership with Davey Resource Group and Greenhill, Smart Tree Inventory utilizes artificial intelligence and LiDAR, a remote sensing technology that uses laser pulses to measure distances and create high-resolution 3D maps, to take a digital inventory of all public trees in the city – especially trees within the boulevards/rights of way.

"We are proud to be the first city in Minnesota to deploy this technology," said City Forester Paul Buck, noting that the city's existing tree inventory is nearly 40 years old and outdated. "This new system will help us preserve trees and diversify Plymouth's tree canopy."

Smart Tree Inventory data collection is slated to begin this spring/summer. Crews will travel the city in vehicles mounted with sensors that can detect and analyze tree size, condition, canopy volume, health and eco-benefits. With an estimated 40,000 trees in Plymouth, the new technology will provide assessments and can compare data over time to measure tree growth and other changes.

"Trees are immensely important for our ecology, as well as our property values," said Buck. "Emerald Ash Borer has taken a toll on our urban forest. This investment in new technology will help us more effectively weather climate changes and manage pests and diseases that impact trees to ensure Plymouth's tree canopy remains healthy and attractive into the future."

Volunteer to Adopt a Spot



Annual water main flushing begins this spring in Plymouth

Like other municipalities, the City of Plymouth is set to complete annual water main flushing this spring.

Annual water main flushing helps maintain high-quality water and removes natural mineral and sediment buildup that accumulates at the bottom of the water main.

Sediment buildup is caused by internal corrosion of the water mains over many years.

In 2025, the city will flush water mains based on the schedule below:

- April 14-18: Industrial and residential areas on both sides of I-494, south of Highway 55.
- April 21 to May 2: Residential areas west of I-494 and south of the Canadian Pacific Railroad tracks. Residential area adjacent to Sunset Trail between Cheshire Lane and County Road 73.
- May 5-9: Commercial and residential areas surrounding the southern and eastern boundaries of Medicine Lake. Commercial and residential on both sides of I-494 generally between Schmidt Lake Road and Highway 55.
- May 12-16: Residential and commercial areas north of 36th Avenue and east of I-494.
- May 19-23: Residential area in the northwest corner, west of I-494. Residential area on northern and western boundaries of Medicine Lake.



Water main flushing is set for this spring to help maintain high-quality water and remove natural mineral and sediment buildup.

To find out when specific areas of the city will be flushed, check the water main flushing map at plymouthmn.gov/watermainflushing or call the Plymouth Maintenance Facility at 763-509-5950.

Residents are asked to keep garbage, recycling and organics containers behind the curb and out of the road during the flushing process to prevent containers from floating down the road.

Residents should also note that water may be discolored throughout this time, but it is more likely while an immediate surrounding area is flushed. Residents may want to avoid doing laundry when flushing is occurring nearby. Residents who notice discolored water should let their outdoor water faucet run until the water is clear.

This year's schedule is as follows:

- 3-6 p.m. Friday, April 25 Only items that are free to dispose/recycle will be collected. Free items include bicycles and bicycle parts, textiles and home goods, paper to shred, used oil, unused winter deicing salt, light bulbs and household batteries.
- 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday, April 26 Pay items and free items alike will be collected. For participants with pay items, cost is per-vehicle, per-trip. Pay items include tires, small engines (lawn mowers, snow blowers, etc.), scrap metal, mattresses and box springs, vehicle batteries, electronics, appliances (non-commercial), bulky items, remodeling material, and construction debris.

Discounted pricing will be offered to those who prepay online (a receipt of sale must be presented at the event). To view pricing and a full list of accepted items for each day, visit plymouthmn.gov/dropoff in April. The event is only available to Plymouth residents – identification is required.

To access the site, vehicles should turn onto Fernbrook Lane from Highway 55 and follow traffic signage to be routed to the site. Vehicles will not be able to turn onto Fernbrook Lane from County Road 6. To view a traffic flow map for the event, visit plymouthmn.gov/dropoff. For safety reasons, residents are asked to remain in their vehicles while at the site.

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
